THE AIM OF THE COURSE:

Through an approach that will make students active participants of the classes, the course aims to provide a broad understanding of the subjects of ethics and economics and how their interlink across several layers. Borrowing concepts as much from economics as from philosophy, the course will cover an umbrella of topics that will provide students with a toolbox for critically reason on economic phenomena that surround us through the lens of ethics. The course will cover key issues from the following (non-exhaustive) list of topics: relationship between ethics and economics; ethics and economics within behavioural and experimental economics; social norms; social welfare functions; business ethics; organizational justice; Environment, Governance, and Society (ESG); Sustainable Development Goals (SDG); Climate change and intergenerational distribution of resources; ethics and economics of artificial intelligence (AI).

DESCRIPTION AND GRADING CRITERIA OF EACH ASSIGNMENT

For the project presentation (30% of the final grade) students will work in small groups of 2-3. Each group will be asked to present to the fellow students a chapter from the handbook of White (2019). The individual contribution to the presentation will be assessed through targeted questions asked during the presentation slot. The written take home exam (70% of the final grade) will be evaluated on the basis of an individual paper that applies the categories learned during the course to a topic agreed with the lecturer. The paper will be due by the date of the final exam and will be evaluated on the basis of originality, clarity, and suitability of the references.

RETAKE POLICY

Group presentation cannot be retaken. Retake covers only the written take home exam (70%) after agreeing another topic (that is different from the previous one) of analysis with the lecturer.
